#### **Energy security**

Power generated at Blue Canyon supports the state of Oklahoma's electric grid. The wind farm contributes to the energy security for the United States, helping diversify domestic supply.

Wind turbines have a limited footprint, leaving 98 percent of the project's leased land undisturbed and available for farming, wildlife habitat, ranching, or recreation.<sup>7</sup>


